As the Orono Public Library Foundation embarks on **Achieving the Vision**, the campaign to expand the Orono Public Library, I am filled with gratitude. This campaign will address the space constraints that were evident even from the first day that we opened the doors in 2009.

Just following the library's opening, I recall a conversation I had with an older gentleman. He spoke of the new ebook format, concerned that one day there would be no print materials and, therefore, no need for libraries. My belief, I reassured him, was physical books would never disappear and ebooks were just another format to access the written word. Libraries are not on the way out, but are adapting and adjusting to new and expanding roles. Our library is fulfilling a key role as a community hub, supporting the social infrastructure of our thriving town.

A typical day at our library sees patrons of all ages and backgrounds participating in numerous activities and services. From a senior housing resident seeking assistance with technology to toddlers and their parents singing and dancing to Miss Lindsay's story time. The afternoon finds teens socializing and making efforts to keep their energy at an appropriate library level. Speedy, the wonder pup romps through the doors with owner Claire Ackroyd, to assist a child in honing their reading skills. Members of the opera, knitting, and Spanish groups come here to relax and to share their common interests.

Our community expands when staff go offsite to visit daycare centers, senior housing as well as partnering with other town departments and outside organizations to bring programs and resources to the wider community.

As we move forward with this campaign to increase space at the library, I feel encouraged and excited, and hope these words are encouraging to everyone. While the services and formats the library offers look slightly different as time passes, the future of the Orono Public Library is brighter than ever.

DEFINING THE VISION

More than 20 years ago, the plans for a new public library were developed by a dedicated group of community members who in 2002 established the Orono Public Library Foundation. The original Foundation board members were committed to building a free-standing public library, to providing for the library's ongoing support, to strengthening the community, and enhancing the quality of life for all Orono citizens.

The Foundation's vision was to create a 12,000 square foot library, based on a survey of community needs. Those plans changed however, due to available funds, and the current 6,500 square foot library was designed with the commitment to building an addition in the future. The library opened in 2009 and was enthusiastically received by a grateful community. Many knew, however, that the Orono Public Library was smaller than what the community needed.

The Foundation, with the support of the Town of Orono and the library staff, is now prepared to achieve the vision shared with the community in 2002, by expanding the library to create additional space for the seniors, teens, children, parents, and other adults who understand that the library is the heart of our community. We have a strong start for the \$8.6 million campaign, and have lined up \$3.6 million in federal funding, thanks to the support of Senator Susan Collins and Senator Angus King. In addition, the Town of Orono, thanks to the support of the Town Council, has pledged \$2.6 million, which along with the federal funds, represents a total of \$6.2 million to begin the campaign. The *Achieving the Vision* campaign will raise the remaining funds from individuals, businesses, foundation, and organizations.

Please join us with your generous gift to expand the library to meet the community's needs. We are profoundly grateful.

KEEPING A PROMISE



In 2002, I was on the original Orono Public Library Foundation Campaign Steering Committee, along with 35 other community members, working to fund a new, stand-alone library. For so very long the

library was housed in Orono High School. The Foundation had just been established in 2003 to secure the funds for the new library, and the Foundation leadership, the late Dana Devoe, and David Chase, both attorneys, were the campaign co-chairs.

It was a special time. The effort to build a new library pulled together a group of people dedicated to the quality of life in Orono. There was great excitement generated over supporting the concept of a new library. Dana secured the land on Pine Steet to build the library and we were all so pleased with the location, in the center of town.

As we worked on the campaign, the funds were growing, and people became more excited. We were told that a 12,000 sq. ft. library would be the right size for Orono, and that's what we wanted to build.

However, it became clear we would not have the funds for 12,000 square feet, and we scaled back. On the day we opened in 2009, the library was filled, and we knew we would plan an addition.

Now, it feels like we are keeping a promise, and now, it will happen.

A STRONG START!

The all-volunteer Orono Public Library Foundation is leading the effort to raise \$2.4 million by March 31, 2026.

The Foundation applied for Congressionally Directed Spending funds in March of 2023. In March of 2024, the Foundation was notified by Senator Collins and Senator King that the request for \$3.6 million for the library expansion project was included in the FY2024 federal budget that was passed by Congress

On December 11, 2023, the Orono Town Council approved a pledge of \$2.6 million to the library project.

Thanks to the tremendous support of Senator Collins, Senator King, and the Town Council, *Achieving the Vision* ~ the Orono Public Library Campaign has secured \$6.2 million towards the \$8.6 million fundraising goal.

Contributions represent the final piece to fund the expansion. We are counting on the support of individuals, foundations, businesses, and organizations to help us raise \$2.4 million to achieve the vision for the library.

A Tribute in Memory of Polly Newton Camp July 29, 1934 - January 11, 2024

Polly knew the value of the library to the community. She was a generous supporter of the OPL and the Orono Public Library Foundation.

When the Foundation began plans for the new expansion of the library, Polly was an early, eager supporter, giving generously before even seeing a rendering of the addition.

The Orono Public Library is people. It is the heart of our community.


All current named gift signage from the first building campaign will be retained and relocated within the expanded library.



WHAT THIS CAMPAIGN WILL ACCOMPLISH WITH YOUR CONTRIBUTION

Achieving the Vision will support a long-awaited expansion of the Orono Public Library from the current 6,500 sq. ft. to 13,750 sq. ft., more than doubling the library's footprint:

- The library addition is designed with much-needed new areas. The new Community Room will be four times larger and features a divider so two groups can meet at the same time.
- An expanded Children's Area will include a larger Storytime room, more floor space, reading areas, a quiet room, and a separate room for programs.
- Teens will have their very own room dedicated to programs for teens.
- The Adult Area will expand with more stacks and a quiet reading room for adults.
- · A tutoring room will serve students of all ages.
- A spacious Community Living Room near the circulation desk includes a coffee bar.
- Staff will have new flexible spaces, a work room, and a break room with a prep kitchen.
- The patio at the rear of the library will expand with more tables and seating overlooking the Orono Village Green.
- · The Orono Village Green will remain a valued outdoor space.

Give securely online using your Visa, Mastercard, Discover, American Express, or Diners Club card on the Foundation's website (https://oronolibraryfoundation.org/).


When you make your gift, kindly consider the automatic prompt asking you to add an amount to cover the surcharge fee charged to the OPLF. Thank you.

Consider recommending a grant from your donor-advised fund to the campaign.






Projected Expenses:

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Gifts of Appreciated Securities

A gift of appreciated stocks, bonds or mutual funds offers a substantial tax advantage for the donor. You can avoid capital gains and deduct the total value of the stock on the date the gift is received by the Foundation. Qualified Charitable Distributions through your IRA

If you're age 70 ½ or older and you need to take a required minimum distribution (RMD, the withdrawals you are legally required to make), you may be eligible to have a qualified charitable distribution to OPLF count toward your RMD up to \$105,000. You can support the Orono Public Library campaign while also potentially satisfying your RMD in the year of your gift.

You should always consult a tax professional to determine your particular tax benefits that may result from any particular type of gift to charity.
